# KAP Survey on Cervical Cancer and HPV in Central America

Findings from the first-ever Cervical Cancer and HPV knowledge, attitudes, and practices (KAP) survey in Central America has been published. The study was conducted in El Salvador as part of Union for International Cancer Control's (UICC) Cervical Cancer Initiative. Findings will assist the Salvadorian Ministry of Health to develop key communication strategies to support national cervical cancer prevention and control efforts and eventual roll-out of HPV vaccine in the country.

The Spanish version of the report is now available. The English version will be available next month.

#### WHO SAGE recommends two-dose HPV vaccine schedule

In our last CCA News Brief we shared the good news that the European Commission had granted marketing authorization for GlaxoSmithKline's Cervarix $^{(8)}$  as a two-dose schedule for girls aged 9 to 14.

Since then, Sanofi Pasteur MSD <u>announced</u> that its quadrivalent HPV vaccine, Gardasil<sup>®</sup>, has received a positive opinion from the European Medicines Agency's Committee for Medicinal Products for Human Use (CHMP) for the use of a two-dose schedule in 9 to 13 year-old adolescent girls and boys.

Also since then, the World Health Organization (WHO) Strategic Advisory Group of Experts on Immunization (SAGE) has recommended a two-dose schedule for girls, if vaccination is initiated prior to 15 years of age. A three-

dose schedule remains necessary if immunization is initiated after a girl's 15th birthday. And a three-dose schedule (i.e., at 0, 1-2, and 6 months) remains recommended for immunocompromised individuals, including those known to be infected with HIV.

## WHO's HPV vaccine communication guidance document now available in French

The WHO publication, <u>HPV Vaccine Communication: Special considerations for a unique vaccine</u> is now available in French as Communication sur le vaccin contre le PVH: Considérations particulières pour un vaccin unique.

### 2014 World Cancer Congress, Melbourne, Australia, 3-6 December, 2014

This year's <u>World Cancer Congress</u> theme, "Joining Forces: Accelerating Progress" will emphasize the impact that can be realized by consistently and energetically applying what we know, rather than waiting for possible future breakthroughs to change the landscape. Participants will leave with an increased understanding of successful interventions in prevention, diagnosis and care, and supportive and palliative care. The 2014 Congress marks the first time that submissions are open not only for scientific papers, but also for practice, policy, advocacy, or fundraising reports.
